The Niagara Parks Foundation offers a unique opportunity for members of the public, including corporations, to actively contribute to one of the world's most beloved public spaces. Niagara Parks operates as a self-supporting, operational enterprise agency of the Ontario Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport. The agency generates revenue from operating guest experiences including attractions, retail shops, restaurants, golf courses, museums, events, as well as transportation and parking services. The Niagara Parks Foundation provides an essential new funding source to advance environmental and cultural stewardship along the Niagara River corridor for the enjoyment of residents and visitors, today and for future generations.



environmental STEWARDSHIP

Niagara Parks is one of Ontario's original environmental organizations. Since its founding in 1885, Niagara Parks has served a mandate that includes the preservation of the globally significant natural habitat along the Niagara River corridor from Lake Erie to Lake Ontario. This diverse ecological environment includes dense forests, vast grasslands, coastal wetlands and many other unique environments that are home to thousands of plant and animal species. Through funding, the Niagara Parks Foundation supports Niagara Parks' steadfast commitment to the environmental conservation of these precious lands.





cultural STEWARDSHIP

The Niagara River corridor is home to a rich and diverse cultural landscape, which stretches back over millennia to its first Indigenous inhabitants, through formative in our nation's history, including the War of 1812 and inspiring stories of the freedom trail that saw enslaved people make their heroic journeys to freedom. The Niagara Parks Foundation seeks to preserve and celebrate this remarkable history through initiatives including heritage restoration, indigenous programming and stewardship-focused research.

FOUNDATION RE-LAUNCH CEREMONY AT BUTTERFLY CONSERVATORY

Earth Day 2022 saw the formal announcement and re-launch of the Niagara Parks Foundation. The event which included remarks from Foundation Chair, Debbie Whitehouse, Niagara Parks Chair, April Jeffs, and others, concluded with a ceremonial tree planting, held in front of the Niagara Parks Butterfly Conservatory. Chair Whitehouse announced that an anonymous donor had agreed to match the day's total donations, up to \$5,000, providing the Foundation with a strong start toward actively supporting key stewardship projects at Niagara Parks.



ANNUAL CLEAN-UP DAY NIAGARA GLEN TRAIL SAFETY AND ECOSYSTEM IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FUNDING ANNOUNCED

Over 100 volunteers were in attendance for the annual Niagara Glen Clean-up Day on May 7, 2022, where Chair Whitehouse formally announced the new Niagara Glen Trail Safety and Ecosystem Improvement Project. Made possible through the generous support of the TD Friends of the Environment Foundation, the project was developed in response to a significant increase in trail use over recent years, to enhance visitor safety at the Niagara Glen, while supporting the preservation of one of southern Ontario's most beautiful and ecologically diverse trail systems.

COMMUNITY TREE PLANTING AT THE NIAGARA GLEN

In partnership with the Niagara Parks Foundation, Niagara Parks hosted its annual Community Tree Planting Day at the Niagara Glen Nature Centre on October 15, 2022. Made possible thanks to the generous donations received through the Niagara Parks Foundation, over 200 native trees were planted during this initiative, which provided an engaging and meaningful opportunity to directly support the critical reforestation of the rare Carolinian forest canopy located along the Niagara River corridor.



One of the priority projects that the Niagara Parks Foundation supports is tree planting along the Niagara River corridor.

Each year, Niagara Parks has a goal of planting 5,000 trees to achieve a 35% canopy cover by 2028.

Thanks to the \$10,000 donation made by Miller Waste Systems, Niagara Parks Forestry team members planted 150 new trees at Paradise Grove, comprised of oak, maple and sassafras, to ensure a diversity of tree species in the area. These efforts were further enhanced through the added support of the Chautauqua Oaks Project, another local collaboration between Niagara-on-the-Lake residents and Niagara College, which donated 65 additional native oak trees.





\$400,000 INVESTMENT FROM TD BANK TO SUPPORT STEWARDSHIP WORK AT DUFFERIN ISLANDS

Through collaboration with the Niagara Parks Foundation, TD Bank Group has committed \$400,000 over the next three years, to launch the Dufferin Islands Visitor Experience and Ecological Enhancement Initiative. This multiphase project, funded through the TD Ready Commitment, will strengthen the overall environmental sustainability of the site. In addition, the project will continue to support meaningful experiences for guests of all ages and abilities, who visit this treasured public park.

Project partners have designed a plan to implement this initiative in multiple phases, over a three-year period. Key project investment goals include:

- Restoring stability along critical sections of the islands, shoreline and the surrounding moraine to protect sensitive habitats, while continuing to safely host visitors year-round.
- Thoughtfully addressing the inventory of aging infrastructure, to identify and remove barriers to increase universal access.
- Developing educational programming opportunities in nature, suited to all ages and abilities. This includes the creation of new interpretive content, in collaboration with Indigenous partners, to foster a greater appreciation of the unique history of this area












MEMORIAL TREE & BENCH PROGRAM
